



AFTER ACTION REPORT OF THE 174 AHC ASSOCIATION 2006 REUNION

Our 2006 reunion was a great success. While our numbers were less than last year, 89 to 120, the comradeship was outstanding. Many of us had the time and the opportunity to talk to members that, previously, we had not time or opportunity to get to know them better. For me, in any event, it was most enjoyable and I now have expanded my list of friends.

While the reunion was scheduled for May 5 thru 7, 2006, a few arrived early, on Wednesday, others, Mary and I included, checked in just after noon on Thursday, and others signed in up through Saturday morning.

The official start was Friday and the social hour and bar-be-que buffet merely added to the day-long socializing. and honored us with a rendition from his bagpipe. Mel then read the list of the fallen whose names are etched on the Vietnam Memorial and finished by reading a touching poem.

Wally and Mel presented special awards. The First to Register award went to **Jonathan Olson.** First to Arrive was **Dennis Fisher,** who also brought some great tasting cheese and sausage from Sauk City, Wisconsin. (Al and Ruth Sarnecki also brought great German styled sausage).

The next award was to **Bruce Marshall,** from Cedar Key, Florida, who brought thousands of clams and barbequed them for our Friday and Saturday consumption. A few thousand thanks to Bruce for his dedication to duty and outstanding tasting clams. Our new slate of officers for the next three years, include: **Marty Heuer as President, Marty Wifholm as Vice President and Bob Jones, re-elected as Secretary/Treasurer.** Marty could not be with us as his family was holding a special 90th birthday party for his mother. Bernie Cobb read Marty’s letter to the group, expressing his regrets. Marty accepts the position of leadership. He intends to seek out former members of the 174th and invite them to participate and feel welcome in an environment that fosters good will, camaraderie, and great memories of our time in Vietnam, no matter what year it was. Marty thanked the wives and sweethearts for their long term support of our members, both during the war in Vietnam and after, and thanked Wally, Mel and Bob for their outstanding leadership and hard work resulting in the successful and well-attended reunions we have enjoyed over the past three years.

Our third drawing was the “Medal of Honor” book, donated by **Wally Nunn** and won by **Carol Bergman**. Carol had announced earlier that she really wanted that book. A few of us began to wonder if the drawing was rigged since Walt won the second drawing and Carol the third. Since we had two nice young children doing the drawing, the idea of a rigged selection was discarded. The fourth drawing was a set of commemorative pins was won by **Tom Caponetto**.

Next was our regular auction. Our auction was lively and lots of fun. Some of our members really let go of their billfolds and pocketbooks. Wally announced that the results of our auction would be for a most outstanding cause, but did not announce until after the action was over that he recommended that we give the results of the auction to **Hal Koster’s** special fund for treating our disabled veterans and their families to a top notch dinner in his restaurant. Checks totaling \$2,015.00 were mailed to Aletia Foundation to be used in support of Hal’s outstanding support of our wounded veterans and their families.

Second item was a commercial quilt with a picture of a Huey going into a LZ with dates of 1959 – 1975 below the picture. **Ken Johnson** won the quilt.

Third item included five sets of the original air mail tablets featuring the 174th AHC, plus a CD of the “High Priced Help” and a Vietnam veteran hat. **Walt Bergman** won the bid.

Sam Davis donated a case of outstanding “rare beverage” for the auction. These bottles were sold individually. **Bob Shoe and Kathy Basler (Mike’s Wife)**, each purchased a bottle. It’s not clear who purchased the remaining bottles, but a few of our members were seen enjoying the “kool-aid” on the patio later.

An original painting by **Ben Kennedy** of a huge Eagle surrounded by all the named locations the 174th operated from in Vietnam. This beautiful painting was won by **John Bond**.

Before closing, **Al Sarnecki** thanked all the members for the many cards and flowers sent to them following the death of his son, **Timothy**, who worked in the Targeting Center of Homeland Security in Rustin, VA.

Wally ended the meeting and we all adjourned to the hotel for continued partying.

Saturday's partying ended sometime in the early hours. A really great time was had by all. It was reported the next morning that some more than others, really enjoyed the evenings activities. No harm, no foul.

Sunday morning saw an extended breakfast with goodbyes from those leaving. Sunday afternoon saw more "chat" groups and Monday's breakfast saw the departure of most of the remaining group.
